During the boundary survey of Camp McCoy during World War II, surveyors from Camp McCoy set a monument at the old occupied corner. These same surveyors also found an unrecorded bearing tree (18" oak) to the Southeast of the corner. Their measurement to the occupied fence corner at the North-Description of corner evidence found: east of Section 3 was 2639.3 feet.

I found a McCoy boundary marker at the old occupied corner. The old fences to the East and North were still in but were down. I accepted this monument as the best available evidence of the original government corner. The old unrecorded bearing tree was gone. I also found a McCoy boundary marker at the Nl/6NE corner. I did not make any measurements however to verify the correctness of the Nl/16NE monuemnt. It does fall in the old East-West fence.
