Local History Room/Wegner Grotto Report (Roll)

- 1. A written report was provided by J. Roll {see attached}
- 2. A financial report was provided by J. Roll {see attached}
 - J. Roll made a note that for the Wegner Grotto, they did hire a company to cut trees down over the winter which was important to the preservation of the site to prevent damage from falling trees. The payment came through grant-generated income.

A motion was made by R. Luethe to accept the History report as presented. Second by D. Pierce. Motion carries 4-0-1 (P. Zastoupil not voting)

Deke Slayton/Bike Museum Report (Young)

- 1. Junior Space Camp registration opened last Monday and it almost half full
- 2. Deke Slayton Space Camp Registration opens up May 2nd
- 3. "Mr. Science" will be coming back to the museum after a 2-year hiatus. This will be free science presentation Thursday, April 21^{st} at 6:30 PM at the museum
- 4. Saturday, May 7th, the museum will be participating at the Bike Trail opening at the Chamber. In conjunction with Monroe County Local History, the museum will be doing "Pop-Up History" where they will present the history of the Bike Trail.
- 5. Saturday, May 14th, 11AM-2PM, the museum is hosting a "Chicken-Q" featuring half a chicken from Rooster Andy's, baked beans, and a roll. Tickets are \$12 and can be purchased on the museum's website: https://dekeslaytonmuseum.org/events/

Fort McCoy Update moved in front of Extension office in Agenda order due to members of the Extension office not yet present

Fort McCoy Update (Townsell) -

- 1. Final data, reports, and edits made for 2021 Fort McCoy Water Report
- 2. Fishing permits expired on March 31st, anglers can now get their fishing permits through https://isportsman.net/
- 3. Fishing season opens Saturday, May 7th. Anglers will need both a state fishing license and Fort McCoy fishing license (which can be found online).
- 4. Completed initial Bald Eagle nest checks for 2022 and eagles were spotted at one nest.
- 5. An update on the collared wolf: she spent the majority of her time in Jackson County forest north of Fort McCoy, then she ventured back onto Fort McCoy during March. All of her locations were documented as north of Highway 21. Approximately 18 miles from her southern-most point on Fort McCoy to her northern-most point in Jackson County.
- 6. Conducted burns over 7 days on about 600 acres which included 'ecological burns' to address the invasive plant species. Wisconsin National Guard got practice training pilots on deploying Bambi Buckets to put out one of the fires.
- 7. The next Invasive Species Working Group will be on April 14th
- 8. Starting updates on the 2022 hunting, fishing, and trapping regulation
- 9. Constructed 45 Bluebird boxes that were damaged or deteriorating and initiated Wood Duck nest box monitoring
- 10. May 21st from 9AM-3PM, Armed Forces Day Open House on Fort McCoy. Food will be available for purchase, admission is free.

 - The students inventoried and assessed the property for tree harvesting, tree thinning, wildlife management, and invasive species and came up with a management plan they presented to the Monroe County Land Conservation Department and Forestry and Parks department.
 - The next step for the class would be to mark trees & harvest boundaries which is planned for Saturday, April 23rd.

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Agriculture Extension Agent: Bill Halfman

Agriculture Program Highlights March 4, 2022 through April 8, 2022

Several planning meetings were held with the Ho Chunk Nation to help facilitate their strategic planning process to get their agriculture division up and going.

A webinar series was held in March titled Optimizing the Value of Beef x Dairy Cross Cattle from Birth to Harvest. The Ag Agent was one of the lead organizers of the series. Topics presented on the first of the two days were Selecting beef bulls to use on dairy cows and Early calf management to get them off to a good start. The second day's topics were Feeding and management from 400 pounds to finish, and Marketing options for selling them. The Ag Agent was one of the presenters on the second day. Ninety-two percent of participants indicated that they had learned some new information and 46 percent indicated that they were going to make changes or use the information to evaluate possible changes to their operations. From the sire selection section responses to a survey indicated 89% of participants responded they would consider using one of the beef sire selection indexes presented. Fifty percent of participants responded they would use the information presented to evaluate potential changes to their operation, and an additional 33% responded they do intend to make changes based on the information presented In addition to Wisconsin we had participants from 14 other states, 6 Canadian provinces, and 8 other countries.

We are offering the Planning for Emergency Livestock Transportation Response on-line course again this spring. The class is designed to better prepare emergency responders for crashes involving livestock transportation vehicles.

The last of the baby calf measurements are being taken for the phenotype projection project. Data analysis has begun. A cooperating farm has been identified to track feedlot performance of beef x dairy cross animals. Two good sets of calves have been weighed.

Field projects for this upcoming growing season are:

- Fiber hemp variety trials at 3 locations for a second year of data.
- Potassium rate trial with hops and a project to investigate evaluating hops plant health with image analysis tools
- Corn nitrogen rate trial

Some site visits have occurred to help some of the Amish folks who grow bedding plants diagnose problems. Impatien Necrotic Spot Virus was diagnosed at one location. Others have been minor problems.

Exploration of Hemp for Fiber Production and Quality in Wisconsin

Introduction

This project was developed to study industrial hemp (Cannabis sativa L.) production and utilization in Western Wisconsin. Trials were planned and established in three locations: Buffalo County, Chippewa County and Monroe County at Whirling Thunder Farm - Ho-Chunk Nation. The 2021 trials were funded through a UW-Madison Division of Extension Innovative grant, Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE) minigrant, and Wisconsin Farmers Union Foundation grant. The Buffalo and Chippewa County sites were grown under conventional management, the Monroe County site was managed using organic approved management and inputs.

Methods:

The experimental design was a randomized complete block with four replications at three sites. There were eight hemp varieties evaluated in the trial. Seeding rates were adjusted for germination rates provided by companies for each variety. The trial was planted at 40 pounds of viable seed per acre in four feet by twenty feet plots. All variety plots were planted using a Hege cone planter in seven-inch rows (photo 4). Planting dates were June 11 (Chippewa), June 15 (Buffalo), and June 16 (Monroe), 2021.

Varieties were selected based on other trials that have been conducted in the United States with similar environments to Western Wisconsin. All are European varieties since they have been involved in fiber hemp production since the 1990's. The varieties were all certified seed from source countries.

Trials at Buffalo and Chippewa Counties were fertilized with 100 pounds of nitrogen using SuperU® nitrogen fertilizer. Monroe County trial also received 100 pounds of nitrogen using Chilean Nitrate fertilizer. Fifty pounds of potassium, and 18 pounds of sulfur were also applied. Weed control at all sites was through hand weeding. Weed issues were not significant at Buffalo or Chippewa Counties, but the Monroe County site had some areas with significant velvetleaf pressure early in the season likely due to uneven germination caused by dry soil conditions and seedbed preparation challenges.

Scouting for insect and disease issues was conducted throughout the season. No significant problems were observed at any of the sites. There were a number of Japanese Beetles at all sites, but no damage was observed that seemed to hinder crop development or yield.

Harvest was conducted two times: in early August for forage yield and quality, and late August for fiber yields. All trials were harvested within three days. Plant heights were taken and a three foot by four feet section was harvested of each variety on one replication for forage yield and quality (only one replication was harvested due to limited funds for testing). Total plant biomass was collected and weighed for each plot. A subsample, of five random plants, was chopped and sampled for dry matter, wet chemistry analysis was conducted for % CP (crude protein) and % TDN (total digestible nutrients).

Hemp for fiber was harvested the end of August, with all three sites being harvested within three days. Plant heights were taken, and males and female plants were counted from a three foot by four foot harvested section of each plot in the trial. Three random plants, from each plot, were kept and sent to the lab for dry matter analysis. Weights were taken on the entire biomass and for the stem alone. Base diameter was recorded on ten random plants within the sample area.

Results:

Yield and Quality: orage Hemp is a popular cattle feed in other parts of the world. Because of the short growing season (planted in mid-June and harvested in early August), it may fit as a planned forage crop or an emergency forage crop in Wisconsin. Hemp is normally harvested and used as livestock feed as female flowers emerge resulting in higher quality forage. The data collected is very preliminary as it was only from one replication at each trial site. There were also issues with lab results from one site, so the quality data was only from two trial sites. It is important to note that hemp currently cannot be legally fed to livestock in the United States.

Maturity of the plants appears to be an issue after analyzing sample results. Some plants were harvested after flowering, not as they emerge, due to timing and feasibility of taking the samples.

More research and sampling of industrial hemp is necessary to determine if it is a suitable forage for livestock feed.

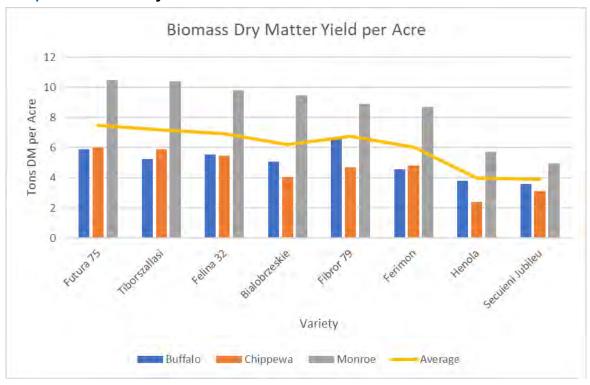

Plant Population: Plant population differences were observed between trial sites. All plots were planted using the same equipment, timing, and seeding rate yet the population differences were large. It appeared that all populations were similar at germination, but early population counts were not taken. In 2022, population counts will be conducted at six inches, at three feet and at harvest to see what changes may occur throughout the growing season.

itrogen Fertilizer Trial: A nitrogen fertilization trial was conducted at all three locations. Plots received 0, 40, 80, or 120 pounds of nitrogen at planting (or just as plants emerged). Yield response was highly variable but does indicate a trend in nitrogen needed by the crop. Choosing varieties that are higher yielding may show more differentiation in nitrogen response.

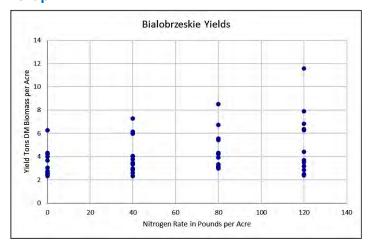
Graph 2 and 3: Yield Response to Nitrogen Fertilizer Rates by Variety

Graphs 2 & 3 display individual plot yields from the three locations. Nitrogen is definitely important for fiber hemp production, but more research will be needed to verify what rates are required.

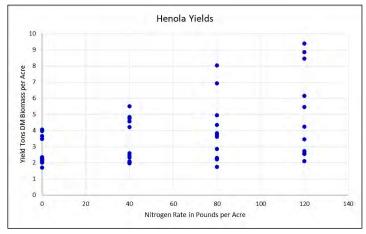
Graph 4: Fiber and Grain Yields at the Chippewa County Plot Site

Grain yields were only taken at the Chippewa County location in 2021 (graph 4). The two highest grain yielding varieties were Futura 74 and Henola. Both of these varieties are considered dual purpose varieties (fiber and grain) so their performance would be consistent with how they were bred and sold in Europe. Yields between 600 – 700 pounds per acre are similar to hemp grain yields of dual-purpose varieties in Canada and Europe. Higher grain yields are typical with varieties that are bred specifically for grain. Grain oil content was not tested in the plots in 2021.

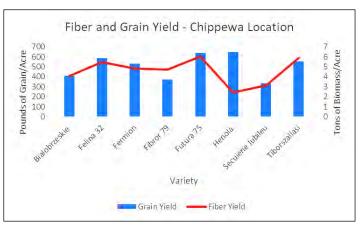

Additional observations regarding the 2021 trials

- Plots in Monroe County were affected by severe storms three times throughout the growing season. High winds were the most damaging result of these storms. Many of the trial plots were almost completely flattened by winds but recovered partially or totally. Many plants were effectively broken off during the third storm but plants that were not, continued to grow (photo 13). Researchers do not have data to show the extent that this damage affected yields.
- Weed pressure varied between the locations but was the worst at the Monroe County trial. Hand weeding was conducted as needed, currently no herbicides are approved at this time. It is extremely important to start with a clean field before planting. At harvest, there were very few weeds at any of the trial locations. Hemp is very competitive under good growing conditions. This is one reason that trials were not planted until mid-June. Hemp likes hot temperatures and seems to out compete most weeds once established.
- Gemination at the Monroe County site was uneven. This is presumed to be a combination of seedbed preparation problems and dry soil conditions at planting. Most of the trial plots seemed to recover from this issue as the growing season progressed.
- Each trial location had a few plants that displayed yellow plants. This was not identified as a pest or disease issue. The most likely cause was the early stages of hybrid development and seed that may not be as pure as we see in other hybrid crops.
- Field days were held at each location. This will continue in 2022 (photo 15).

arly Economic Review: Because of the very limited market opportunities for fiber hemp, revenue was not included in the 2021 partial budget. A breakeven price was included as a target for future market considerations. The 2021 study included both conventional and organic production systems, therefore expenses for both were included in this budget. Yield will be a large factor in the breakeven cost. In this sample budget, an average yield of five ton per acre was used. Grain yield and income were not considered in this budget. Future Plans: Trials will continue at all three locations in 2022. Researchers will continue to look at recommended fiber varieties, forage quality, and add a trial on seeding rate. Additional data will be collected including stand counts throughout the growing season. Forage quality data measures will be added in 2022 that will allow researchers to measure the digestibility of hemp forage.

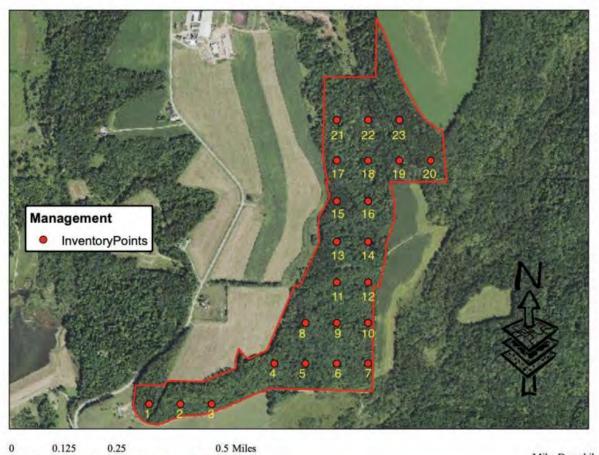

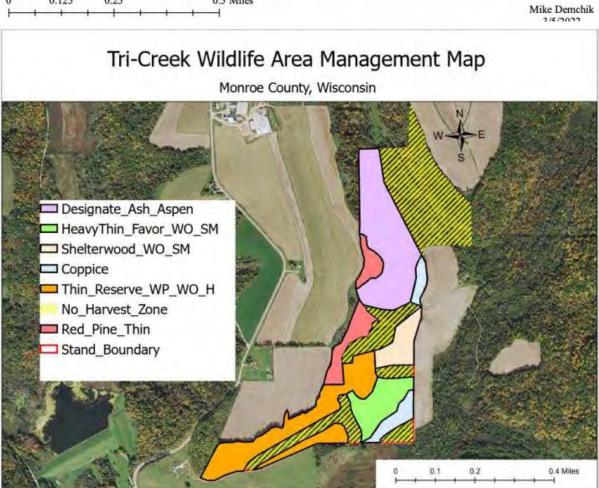
- <u>Summer Interns</u>— The LCD is currently advertising for two summer interns to continue the crossing inventory & assessment that was started in 2021.

- This report does not follow its 1st objective.
- This report is not unbiased. Government sponsored reports can have partners, but should be unbiased.
- I requested the leaders change the report to follow their objectives, but they would not complete modeling and had no economic analysis.
- We can do better representing what is happening in our county.

Shortfalls/Inaccuracies

- Lack of Accurate Modeling for Objective 1
- Lack of New Data and Models

- No Economic Analysis was performed.

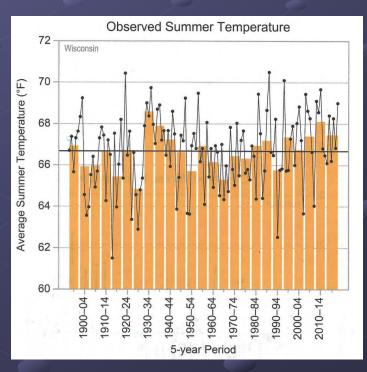

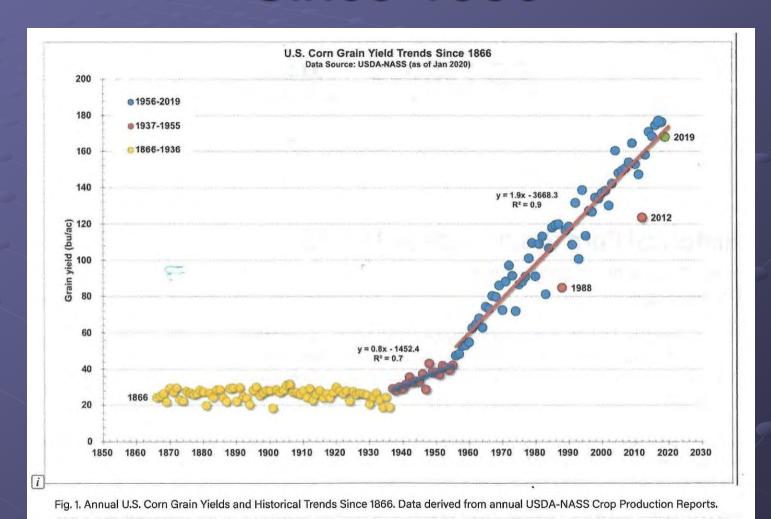

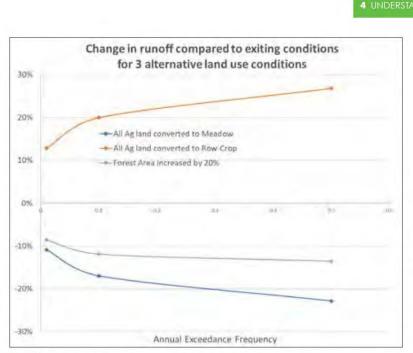


Figure 6: Timber Coulee Creek Flood Modeling Results

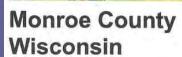

• Modeling is incomplete and misleading and does not represent current agricultural practices.

• Model assumed all fields were in row crops with full tillage. This has never happened in Monroe County and we have been implementing conservation practices for almost 100 years.

- Report should not include a figure that doesn't show our current agricultural conditions.
- Graph is very misleading and incomplete!
- Data was available to run model correctly from the USDA Census of Agricuture which was Reference #5. We used this type of modeling in the Pleasant Valley Watershed Project in Dane County.

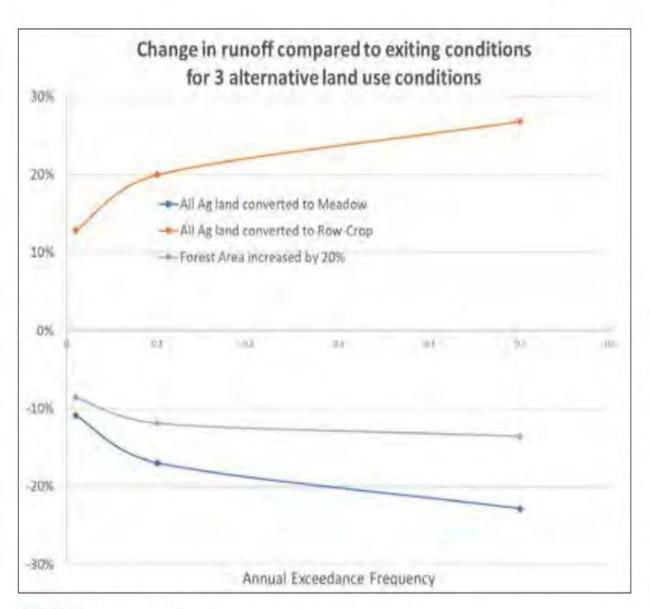


Figure 6: Timber Coulee Creek Flood Modeling Results

FORESTRY & PARKS DEPARTMENT DUTIES

PARKS

Manages one county day-use park and one campground and day-use park. The county parks serve an estimated 10,000 campers and visitors per year. Facilities include 50 acres of grounds, 71 multiple unit sites plus 20 overflow sites, 13,000 square yards of asphalt, 15 structures, 2 boat launches and 2 miles of hiking trails. The parks use and maintain 10 pieces of motorized equipment and additional power tools.

FORESTRY

The Forestry Department manages 7,442 acres of County Forest which includes selling and administering 230 acres of timber sales, completing 600 acres of forest inventory and treating approximately 25 acres of invasive species annually. Maintains 35 miles of forest roads and 60 miles of property boundaries. There are 1500 acres of backlog timber sales to review and set up and 350 acres of backlog invasive treatments. In addition to these responsibilities, the county owns 800 acres of "other" forest land that either needs inventory updates or timber sale work completed on it.

SNOWMOBILE TRAILS

Serves as the Snowmobile Coordinator for 312 miles of trails in Monroe County. Snowmobile duties include applying for annual maintenance grants, bridge grants, new trail miles grants and supplemental maintenance grants. The county maintains the snowmobile trail GIS layer and monitors the Groomer Tracking Systems website to make sure that GPS units are working properly and recording grooming hours. Approximately 700 grooming and non-grooming maintenance entries are reviewed and approved annually.

PARK MANAGER DUTIES

The Park Manager position will maintain facilities and grounds (50 acres), collect park fees, make deposits, purchase supplies, assist campers and write grant applications. Interview, hire, train and supervise seasonal employees. Operate equipment, repair and winterize facilities and equipment. Prepare and maintain plans for park maintenance and development. Serve as project coordinator for capital development and capital improvements. Assist with forestry duties: conduct forest inventory, establish property boundaries, control invasive species and establish timber sales. Many new opportunities will be explored by the Park Manager such as accepting camping reservations, credit card payments, increasing park attendance, assisting with a new shower building and the new park development on Copper Road.

This position will provide the department with increased skilled labor, staffing continuity from year to year, organization, knowledge and professionalism. It will allow the Forestry & Parks Administrator to concentrate more effort on backlog forestry practices, cleaning up boundary issues, land acquisitions and other duties.

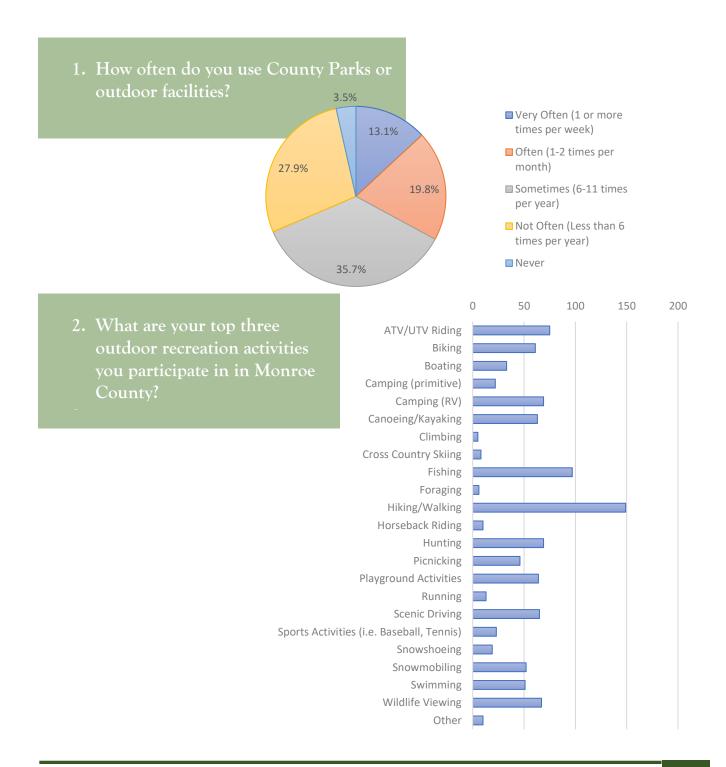

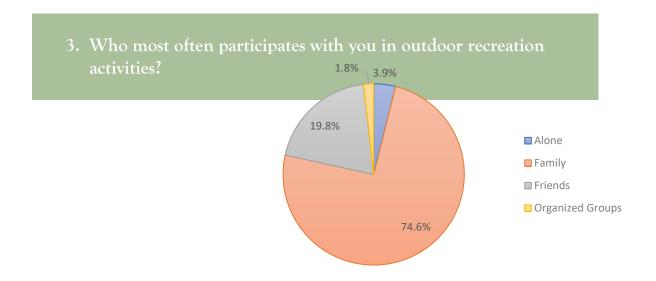

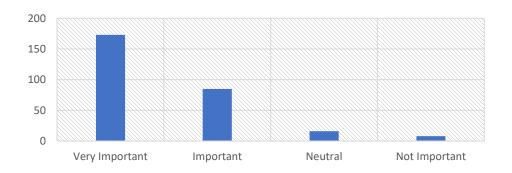
Survey Results

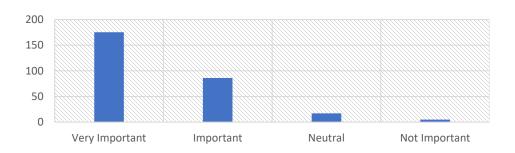




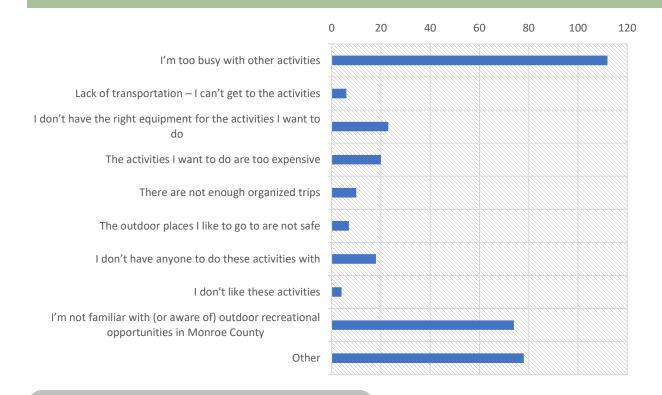

5. How important do you feel improving outdoor recreation opportunities are to the future and economy of the County?

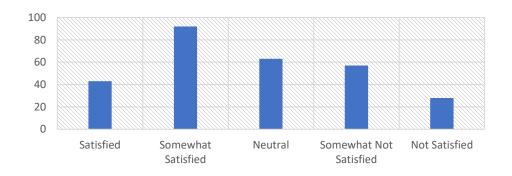


6. If you feel you spend too little time participating in outdoor activities, what keeps you from spending more time?

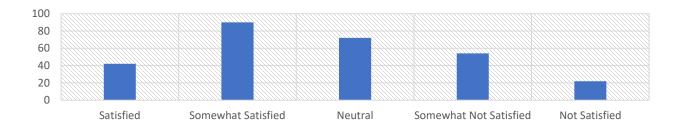

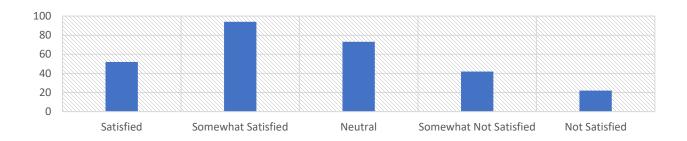
7. The number of outdoor parks/facilities available in Monroe County

- Could use more space
- Number seems adequate and maintenance is quite satisfactory
- I see a lot of time spent mowing while invasive species control is ignored.
- Logging on Festival Avenue property is devastating this valuable property as a
 recreational asset. Such a shame to ruin this quality property, so accessible to one of
 Monroe County's main population centers. And for what, a pittance. I counted 130
 rings on one of the logs that were cut, most around 80 years old. So sad to ruin this
 asset so valuable for future generations and for carbon sequestration. Now it is a
 wasteland with a new garlic mustard infestation, and existing barberries that will go
 wild. What the heck.
- Need more wooded hilly hiking trails free of ATVs and snowmobiles. I can't walk on concrete as it's very hard on feet knees and hips. Have a website that shows all facilities in Monroe County and where to park for access.

- No horse trails & places to park horse trailers & get on any trails
- There is only 1 big park that I know of and another little wayside
- More marketing on what actually is available would be helpful
- My family and I like to camp together. McMullen Park is one of our favorite camp grounds.
- We only have one county park. Mill Bluff is a state park and the Angelo park is a wayside. We are the 19th largest county in the state out of 72 and we only have one park. McMullen is a nice park, lots to do and we'll maintained, but it should be because you only have to maintain one park! I don't use it due to how far it is from where I live in southern Monroe County. Please find a park that either has a stream or has bluff land for hiking or both. It will help tourism as well as benefit county residents.
- Any more parks might be harder to maintain the quality of the parks.
- I am not sure where to even find a list of Monroe County facilities.....
- Elroy-Sparta bike trail---WAY too long to get it repaired after flooding, Kendall depot needs to be open for bathrooms, water, info. When trail is not mowed regularly and the predominant plants one sees are invasive species; I'll go somewhere else. I realize you might be asking just for areas that the county is responsible for maintaining and if I am recreating in the boundaries of Monroe County much more likely to be using state/federal property.

The Monroe county Flowage is a beautiful area but the access road is often not well maintained. Canoe/kayaking especially for bird watching needs help keeping the "canals" between the two parts of the flowage free of down trees.

Cross country skiing/snowshoeing could be expanded if only someone would plow out decent areas to park a vehicle.

• Some bike trails-Great River Road for example- seem abandoned, never graded, and have turned into two tracks. This limits bikers with child trailers, etc.

Some park infrastructure is getting tired, needs replacing or upkeep. Bathrooms picnic areas.

- I am not familiar with these items and don't feel comfortable expressing satisfaction nor dissatisfaction.
- It seems as if often times the bathrooms are below standards.
- The shelters at the parks could use a facelift.
- I don't agree with the county buying that land up in Warrens near the other county land. It's out of the way, and I don't think the current recreation land is being used by very many people. Do you have a count of how many residents have used that land in the last year? 5 years? 10 years? With a population in Monroe County of around 46,000 residents, I don't see enough residents using it to make it worth the money being spent on it. Even if there are visitors using the land, how much

- economic impact have they given the county? I do not believe the purchase of more recreational land would be fiscally sound for Monroe County.
- Monroe Co. must retain ownership of all its county lands, people need as much "Green Space" as possible. Hiking, snowshoeing, biking, nature viewing are becoming more popular as upcoming generations have less opportunities to experience the outdoors in their backyards. I feel that the more properties for public use are offered and maintained to some degree the less pressure will be put on the agricultural and rural lands for development. Our towns and cities can expand vs. the rural landscape.

We need to offer more areas for hiking/snowshoeing and maintain trails and facilities such as restrooms, small shelters, trash disposal, interpretive signage/centers and putting the media effort to the public about these recreational resources.

There are too few parks, etc. for non-motorized recreation in Monroe County and what is available on larger scales seems to only offer opportunities to hunters.

Thank you for offering the survey.

- The little lacrosse from leon to Rockland area could be a beautiful kayaking route with alot of work clearing log jams. Since the lacrosse river is effectively the only kayak canoe opportunity in monroe county, adding 5 to 8 miles of the little lacrosse river would almost double the paddling opportunities in the county. I did the route last summer during normal water levels and the only problems were the massive and frequent log jams.
- Most of the playgrounds in the city of Sparta have the same exact equipment and much of it is broken. New playground equipment needs to be installed and parks should be different to offer variety. I would love to see a splash pad in a park for hot summer days add an outdoor skating ice rink that could double as a basketball court in summer.

Sparta is the biking capital right? How else can we encorporate that? Could we have a BMX bike course somewhere?

- Pot holes need to be fixed, lines on pavement at stop signs, garbage checked more often
- If we could find a place and work force for a botanical garden/ and or a community garden that would be nice.
- Some items aren't maintained, picnic tables, rest areas,
- The bike trail can use some improvement and maybe someone to regulate the
 assholes that are getting on there with motorcycles and tearing up the trail. This last
 year I was biking the trail from Sparta to Tunnel 3 3-4 times a week. Every day I
 would find some new form of damage from what I assume was either a motorcycle
 or an electric dirtbike.

If Sparta is the bicycing capital, shouldnt there be more bike related options? How about a pump track or a mountain bike course near the campground just outside of Sparta. There is enough hill there to make a fun little trail.

From what I had read on the web, electric bikes are welcome on the trail only if the motor helps power the crank and does not provide power to the bike without the crank being turned. Once a week this last year I was being passed by people on fully electric bikes, drinking beer and smoking cigarettes.. Is that where the trail is going? Its going to be just like snowmobilers, driving recklessly and drinking alcohol? My 13 year old and his friends can't go on the trail without an adult, but a bunch of drunk assholes can tear up the trail with no repercussions? One idiot damn near ran me off the trail when she tried passing me with her three wheeled fully electric bike.. She didn't bother to tell me she was coming up behind, must have thought it would be fun to buzz close to me, I had to leave the trail as her rear tire clipped me left pedal. Didnt stop, didnt say sorry, just cranked her throttle open and sped down the trail.

The word I hear lately is the group who pushed for legalizing atv use in Sparta is gonna try to get ATV use on the bike trail. If that happens, the trail will be useless to anyone on a bicycle. A shelter and bathroom facility would allow for more use. Also, subdivision (Park Place) by the water dept./tower in Sparta needs a park for kids to play. - Improve or modify bike trail to allow ATV use besides snowmobile and bikes might need to be wider in areas
- It would include "quiet" low impact activities preserving water resources, plant species, and wildlife
- Maximizing wild lands, maintained for rare ecosystems that are becoming fewer and fewer with passing of time, such as old growth forests, and prairies. It is so important to protect these places for research, sensitive wildlife, and educating future generations.
- Clean sandy beach with swimming facilities, picnic and play ground areas and seasonal snack bar. Public toilet and shower facilities. Hiking trails with look outs.
- Because it's part of the Driftless Area, Monroe County has a lot of very beautiful, rolling land. I know much of it is privately owned, but it would be fantastic if the county could establish a large park where people could go on extensive hikes...not just quick hikes over one or two hills, but long hikes over bluffs and down into

- valleys. Some of the best outdoor experiences I've had in Wisconsin include parks with extensive hiking trails. I'm thinking Governor Dodge State Park, Hixon Park in La Crosse, Perrot State Park, and so on. Even better, these parks/trails could connect to biking trails and riverways, and allow visitors multi-faceted experiences.
- Nice beaches with outdoor activities for children. Outdoor classes for children to learn more about the outdoors and get them off devices.
- Something similar to Wildcat Mtn SP or Devils Lake St Park. Lots of hiking with some elevation and no motors. Picnic area and year round bath facilities. Wildflower and native prairie areas.
- Hiking, kayaking groups. Rentals locally for kayaks, canoes, snow shoes etcetera.
 Mosquito control.

- ATV/UTV Park. Hundreds of acres devoted to trail riding of all levels from gentle family rides to hard-core rock climbing style. Trails could include walking/biking sections to appeal to all groups. Position in area to allow private investment for lodging and food.
- Accessible Marketing: For anyone staying anywhere in/near Monroe County, it should be easy any time of year to find what is available. Whether that's snowmobile trail status, events at Lake Tomah, or the best bird-watching views at Ft. McCoy based on current migration patterns - we should make it extremely accessible to enjoy our area for both residents and tourists. Ideally, an app that is updated regularly by the various stakeholders. This can be then be advertised in Chicagoland, Twin Cities, Milwaukee, etc.

Don't try to be what we aren't: We will never be Wisconsin Dells. Or Hayward. How can we identify our areas strengths/gifts and build on those traditions?** We provide a happy medium of small-town calm, with accessible options not found in more isolated "up north" locations. Develop a "Monroe County bucket list" of sorts to help both residents/tourists.

Collaboration: It isn't realistic for the county to run/operate/maintain by itself. How can we leverage local partnerships to promote and improve the quality of life for our citizens? Can Matthews sponsor playground equipment? Toro sponsor maintenance tools, etc? I think any upgrades in the county would be big draws for local businesses. What role does local Parks and Rec/City collaboration look like? Summer school opportunities within school districts to integrate outdoor lifestyles/base knowledge early? We are close to 3 local colleges that create pipelines for filling our workforce. Can we tap into those relationships? What does our county AirBnB presence look like?

Ideal: Something that draws people regardless of seasons. Lake/river fun by summer, ice skating/fishing by winter, lodging on-site/close, close to atv/snowmobile trails, dedicated non-motor areas, etc.

What falls under "outdoor recreation"? Outdoor music/concerts could help improve collaboration and usage, if done correctly. Can we recruit conventions/conferences with intention to increase usage? Ex: Retreat Center with on-site lodging and

"summer camp"-esque environment.

Copied from last question in case I wasn't supposed to answer:

I also am unsure of specific designations between "county" and "city" or other division of responsibilities. What does overlap look like? What can co-management and ownership look like? Sharing of resources will be more critical as budgets continue to be squeezed everywhere but shareholder returns.

Expand outdoor amphitheater use and access: Evans-Bosshard Park in Sparta example has infrastructure to not have to build from scratch, but could host outdoor environmental classes, concerts, etc.

For Sparta specifically, it would be great to have a canoe/kayak/tubing company from Angelo to Fisherman's Park. Then from Fisherman's Park to Amundson Park. With the Kickapoo flooding likely to increase in the future, establishing another safe local option could help a lot. Should also establish river maintenance/clean-up plan in process.

- We should have more areas where the public can come together and do things.
 More camping places would be good for the economy in the area. Also, having more trails for Atv/Utv would be cool and more biking trails.
- Kayak and Canoe rentals in the city on our local rivers and lakes

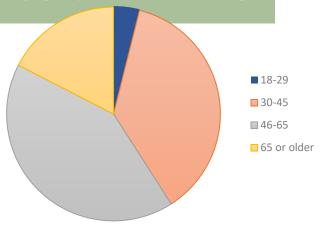

 - Fish conservation, growing more fish to stock local waterways, to make the the sport more enjoyable for current enthusiasts and future generations.

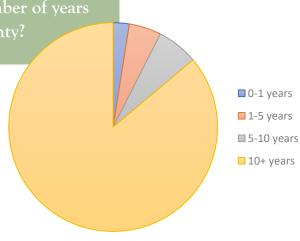

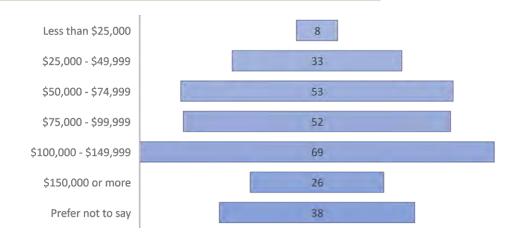


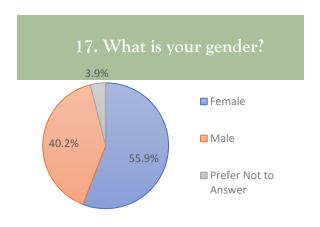


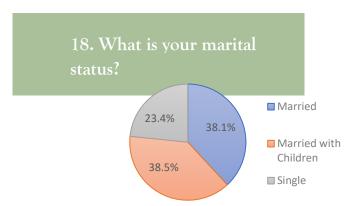
15. Which best describes the number of years



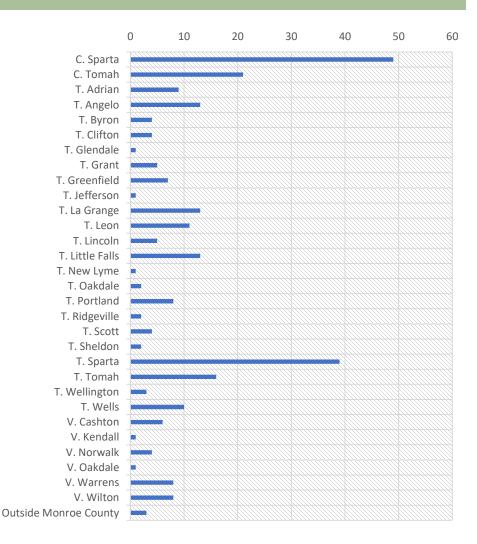
16. What is your total household income

City of Tomah:

- As an official from the city of Tomah, something I've always admired about the city of Sparta is how it's incorporated walking and biking into its layout. I know it's because the city is much more compact and has the Elroy-Sparta Trail, but it's much easier to walk/bike from one end of Sparta to the other, than walk/bike from one end of Tomah to the other.
- Often, I see people walking to the northern businesses in Tomah on foot, which is extremely dangerous because they're walking on the shoulder of ALT I-94/Superior Avenue. Tomah has a great trail system south of Veterans Avenue, but almost nothing north of Veterans. It's like the northern half of the city is completely disconnected from the southern half, and only available to those who drive.
- I know there has been talk of adding more trails. I only hope the city tries to connect the northern section of Tomah to the southern ("downtown") section.

Transfer

Purpose

To transfer budgeted expense/revenue amounts from one line item to another within the same budget so as not to exceed adopted budget by rollup code.

Policy

A transfer of funds should be made prior to an individual line item balance exceeding the line item budget as adopted. No transactions should be posted to any budget line item if there are not adequate budgeted funds available to cover those transactions during that fiscal year.

In the event a department has insufficient line item budgeted funds available to cover the balance of proposed transactions, a transfer of budget funds from another individual line item within that department's budget to cover those transactions may be initiated with prior approval.

All transactions shall be charged to the appropriate revenue/expenditure account, not arbitrarily charged to accounts where unused budget funds are available.

Procedure

To initiate the line item transfer process, the department head shall notice the review, discussion & action of this completed and signed form on the next monthly meeting agenda of their committee of jurisdiction.

If the Line Item Transfer is approved by the committee of jurisdiction *AND IS FOR AN AMOUNT OF \$500 OR LESS* the signed copy of this form along with a copy of the meeting minutes shall be forwarded to the County Administrator for approval.

If the Line Item Transfer is approved by the committee of jurisdiction *AND IS FOR AN AMOUNT OF MORE THAN \$500* the signed copy of this form along with a copy of the meeting minutes shall be forwarded to the County Clerk to be noticed on the Finance Committee agenda for review, discussion and action.
