The meeting notice was posted in compliance with the open meeting law.

Call to Order: Chair N. VanWychen called the meeting to order at 8:35 a.m.

Public Comment Period: None

Approve Minutes from the December 8th NR & Extension Meeting: The committee reviewed the minutes. *A motion was made to approve the minutes as presented by W. Habhegger, second by J. Schroeder. Motion carried 3-0-2.*

Deke Slayton/Bike Museum: A. Karrels reported the Craft Day held at the end of December was successful. Karrels discussed the upcoming 20th Anniversary celebration to be held June 15, 2019. Karrels discussed using County Farm Education funds to help with the Traveling Space Museum and was advised by the committee to request on the next agenda. Karrels reported there will be a Junior Space Camp in June and mentioned an Endowment fund was set up at the end of the year with an initial deposit of \$25,000. (Handouts attached).

Local History Room/Wegner Grotto: J. Roll reported 1300 attended the promoted "Monroe County in Miniature" model railroad display in the month of December. Roll discussed the offsite storage and moving artifacts and shelving this Friday the 11th. Roll also stated the Grotto repairs will be from an out of state source coming during the summer to repair sculptures. (Report attached). *Motion was made by J. Schroeder to accept the History Room and Museum reports as presented, second by N. VanWychen. Motion carried 3-0-2.*

- 5. **Agriculture Report** (Halfman) B. Halfman mentioned his article in the "Progressive Dairyman" magazine and showed the article to the committee- report attached.
- AED Update (Saxe) None.
 Motion made by J. Schroeder to accept Agent reports and review of expenditures, second by W. Habhegger. Motion carried 5-0.

Kevin Raymer FSA Rep arrived at 10:00 A.M.

Forestry & Parks:

- 1. **Forestry & Park Updates:** C. Ziegler discussed the Gerrard parcel acquisition which will be closing on the 16th of this month. Ziegler handed out 3 maps and explained the boundary work that is being completed on the county forest. (Report/maps attached)
- 2. **Review/Approve Resolution Amending Monroe County Camping Fees:** Camping fees were discussed. *Motion was made by A. McCoy to approve Resolution, second by D. Pierce*. Discussion followed. *W. Habhegger made a motion to table until the next meeting, second by J. Schroeder. Motion carried 6-0.*
- 3. **Review Forestry & Parks December Expenditures:** C. Ziegler submitted December monthly expenditures.

DNR Reports:

- Private Lands: M. Mickelson reported the State Nursery is nearly out of trees and the waiting list for next year has begun, also mentioned if need trees to order early. Mickelson reported the MCISWG (multi-agency) will be meeting later this January to determine the direction for the organization for 2019. Mickelson reported that last year they had two successful field days, geared towards the education of invasive species in Monroe County and tactics to control species.
- 2. Warden: Modjeski spoke briefly regarding the first, hopefully annual going forward, deer carcass dumpster being available for the public at the Tomah Ranger Station. He also advised of a couple of smaller antlered bucks being mistakenly harvested during the Statewide Antlerless Deer Season in Monroe County and one smaller antlered buck being mistakenly harvested during the Holiday Hunt Antlerless Deer Season in December in Monroe County. In addition, on 12-01-17 a deer feeding and baiting ban went into effect in Monroe County and numerous citations for feeding deer were issued during the 2018 deer seasons.
- 3. **MFL**: None

NRCS Report: M. Komiskey reported the NRCS remains open during this partial government shutdown. However, FSA is furloughed. Komiskey stated her office is essentially fully functional, continues to assist customers, and is taking messages for their sister agency, if someone stops in looking for FSA staff. Komiskey mentioned, that the Farm Bill has been signed and is in law, and continue to wait for policies and procedures from the national offices. Komiskey reported on follow-up from random compliance reviews from the summer of 2018 and working on EQIP planning for the local work group and RCPP TU funding. Komiskey stated, would expect to know funding for 2018 storm damage relief and conservation activity plans soon. Komiskey also reported, from FSA that impacts NRCS, Mark Mulder retired as well as Margie Spohn, and stating that NRCS works with FSA daily and their assistance through the years have been appreciated and we wish them well into retirement.

Land Conservation Department:

- 1. **2018-2018 Land & Water Resource Mgt. Plan-Public Hearing:** B. Micheel discussed the Land & Water Resource Mgt. Plan in depth and handed out copies to the committee. No Public comment.
- 2. **Review December Expenditures:** B. Micheel reviewed expenditures.
- 3. **County Conservationist Report:** B. Micheel announced the re-advertising of the Land Use Planner position in January, as the number one candidate took a different job. Micheel also gave an update on the PL566 Dams and the meeting with NRCS, DNR, and Vernon County to discuss options on the three breached structures in the Coon Creek watershed. (Report attached).
- 4. **Soil & Water Conservationist Report:** C. Mulder handed out a copy of the Contractor Update Newsletter to the Committee and gave a brief summary. (Report attached).
- 5. **Review/Approve- Valley Junction Sand Mine Reclamation Plan:** B. Richardson handed out a summary page of the reclamation plan and discussed details. (Summary attached). *Motion was made by J. Schroeder to accept Valley Junction Sand Mine Reclamation Plan as presented, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 6-0.*
- 4. **Next Meeting:** The next meeting will be held Tuesday, February 19, 2019 at 8:30 a.m. at the Monroe County Ag Services Center in Sparta.






County Forest Boundary Markers, Township of New Lyme



With our 20th anniversary approaching we've developed an engagement plan which includes equipment upgrades, remodeling, and financial planning to take the museum into the future!

DONE $\sqrt{}$ Established an endowment for the Museum:

Endowments are a common nonprofit funding practice in which funds are specifically restricted and invested; and then the museum receives the interest from that investment to use for general operating costs. Usually the interest is about 5% of the total endowment value. The intent is to never spend the initial investment, but let it grow and only use the interest.

We are proud to announce that by the end of November this year we will have a \$25,000 endowment fund established for the Deke Slayton Museum through the Wisconsin Historical Society Foundation. To fully support our current operating budget we would need \$1.8 million in the endowment so it will take many years for us to achieve this goal, but establishing an endowment now is a solid step toward insuring the future of the museum!



TO DO Custom entrance desk & new computer and software:

The next step for the museum is to build a custom entrance desk where we can greet visitors, ring up gift shop items, and the administrative staff can use on a day to day basis. This includes replacing the 9 year old computer we currently use and getting software to manage the gift shop. We hope to complete this in early 2019.

DONE $\sqrt{}$ New carpeting in entrance area:

The 20th Anniversary engagement plan began this spring with the installation of new carpeting in the entrance area by Leon Country Floors (the old carpet was pushing 20 years and was really showing its age). The students of High Point school volunteered and moved all the furniture in and out of the entrance area for the carpet installation, thanks guys!





DONE $\sqrt{\text{New gift shop shelves:}}$

Next we phased out the inherited furniture in the entrance area and commissioned Leis Carpentry to build custom gift shop shelves for the museum's unique entrance area and we've really noticed an uptick in gift shop sales! It makes a great first impression on all visitors who walk through the door.

TO DONew carpeting in museum gallery: The main museum gallery, used by the Masons as their meeting hall, still has the original carpeting dating back to the 1970s, making it almost 50 years old and in desperate need of replacement! The museum's goal is to replace this carpeting in 2019.

TO DOChanging exhibit area: The most ambitious goal of the engagement plan is to develop a changing/temporary exhibit space in the museum entrance area where a new exhibit will be unveiled each year. We currently don't have room for changing exhibits, but this new plan will free up space for one. We'll be inviting local businesses and individuals in the community to sponsor the changing exhibit area and their name will be featured in our new exhibit area.

Deke Slayton Space Camp 2018

The Deke Slayton Space Camp program was established in 2016 to inspire students to become America's next astronauts, those that will go to Mars!

We created Space Camp because NASA's current roster of 50 astronauts only has a handful from the Midwest. With our Museum being dedicated to one of the US's first astronauts we want to change those numbers!

We began Space Camp in 2016 with 8 students and we're proud to share that since then the camp has grown and in 2018 we had 20 students! We are already planning for 2019 and really looking forward to offering this camp for many years to come.

It is our museum mission to connect space camp participants to

"Knowledge, creativity, and inspiration"

This is a week long day camp running Monday-Friday from 8:00am- 5:00pm for students going into 5th-8th grades in the next school year. We really keep the kids hopping, they are pretty tired by the end of the day!

Activities include: In the mornings we meet at the museum and do team building activities and feature guest speakers including a biomedical engineer from NASA, the head of the magnetosphere lab at Goddard Space Center, pilots, STEM teachers, Meteorology professors, nutrition experts, and more!

In the afternoons we head over to Sparta City Hall where we build rockets, program robots, and do hands on STEM challenges.

Wednesday is our special field trip day. We start in the morning by visiting the radio control flyers and learn about the principles of flight, then we go to the Sparta pool and conduct zero gravity experiments. In the afternoon we go to the Sparta airport and talk with pilots, and we finish the day in LaCrosse with a visit to the planetarium.

Throughout the week we strongly emphasize teambuilding. All astronauts work in teams and it is one of the most valuable skills they say we should be teaching our students. The students are split into groups of four and each day a different student is the team leader for their group. It is an excellent opportunity for the students to both lead and follow.

The last day of camp is Friday. First thing in the morning students launch the rockets they built at Southside Elementary School. It really is a "blast" to watch all of those rockets fly into the air! Friday is also special because retired astronaut Mark Lee, originally of Viroqua, visits in person and gives the students a special presentation on his time as an astronaut which includes 4 space shuttle missions and was the first astronaut to use a jet pack in space!

The grand finale is Friday evening with a graduation ceremony and a big "party" as the kids call it with a visit from retired Astronaut Mark Lee! During the graduation ceremony the students receive a diploma from the Museum Board President and a member of the Sparta City Council. They also receive a very special pin presented by Mark Lee. The graduation ceremony is followed by a dinner for the students and their families, and Mark Lee gives a presentation to the audience as well. It is an amazing week that the kids love and will never forget.

The 2019 Space Camp is scheduled for Monday, July 29th- Friday, August 2nd. The camp is for students going into 5th-8th grades the following school year. If you would like to put your child's name on the contact list for when we release the application materials please contact us at 608-269-0033, and we'll get you on the list! The application materials will be available on the Museum's website around March 1st, 2019. The cost of the camp is \$395 for early bird sign-ups through March 15th, and after that it is \$445. We'll also be offering at least two full-ride scholarships, one for a boy and one for a girl. It is first come first serve, open to all middle school age students, and space is limited so make sure to sign up early!

There are so many individuals and community organizations that contribute to making this camp possible, and we'd like to recognize and thank our 2018 supporters for their incredible generosity.



Lee Olson, co-founder of Space Camp, has passed



We are very sad to report on the passing of Lee Olson, co-founder of the Deke Slavton Space Camp program. Lee Olson was a dedicated Museum Board Member who cared deeply about the museum. His involvement with the museum began over 10 years when he brought his grandchildren Brandon and Allison to explore the children's play area.

During those visits we got to know Lee very well and were thrilled when he agreed to be on the board. Over the years Lee was constantly thinking of ways he could contribute to the museum, how we could make the museum an even greater resource for the community's children. During one of our many brainstorming phone conversations the idea of a "space camp" emerged, and as they say- the rest is history. Our first year of space camp required a lot of ingenuity on our part to find funding, recruit presenters, develop a schedule, and find ways to get information to those kids that were interested!

Lee was on top of all of it- He leveraged his contacts to find interesting and qualified presenters, he asked his friends for donations for scholarships, he had us get a white board to lay out the schedule, and his grandson Brandon attended the very first camp! Lee's passion for the program only grew over the years as he continued to find new presenters and help solicit funds for the program. He would always say "I'll do anything for my kids"- and that is how he thought of the program attendees- as his space camp kids. Even with failing health he continued to do everything in his power to plan for the next space camp. We had 8 kids our first year, and in our third year we had 20. We have return presenters each year including NASA scientists and retired astronauts. Last year we were able to offer four full-ride scholarships. This is all part of Lee's legacy, and that legacy will live on as we plan our 4th space camp for 2019 and as we establish a new space camp for younger children. Without Lee this amazing program would not exist, we have lost a great friend and planning for the next space camp will not be the same without him.

Space Camp 2018— What did the kids think?


At the end of every day the students had some quiet time to reflect on the day and answer questions in their log books about the different activities they participated in. Here are some of those responses:
