### Monroe County Natural Resource and Extension Committee

Regular Monthly Meeting – June 12, 2018 Monroe County Ag Service Center – 820 Industrial Dr., Sparta, WI

Committee Members present: N. VanWychen, D. Pierce, J. Schroeder, W. Habhegger, A. McCoy, and D. Powell (FSA Rep).

The meeting notice was posted in compliance with the open meeting law.

**Call to Order:** Chair VanWychen called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

**Public Comment Period: None** 

**Approve Minutes from the May 8th NR & Extension Meeting:** The committee reviewed the minutes. *A motion was made to approve the minutes as presented by D. Pierce, second by J. Schroeder. Motion carried 5-0.* 

**Committee Composition and Duties:** C. Holzl handed out copies of the Land Conservation Composition along with the Forestry & Parks Composition and duties. After some discussion and suggestions, it was agreed to re visit at the next meeting.

**Deke Slayton/Bike Museum:** Alli gave a report on her activities and stated the Museum would be celebrating a 20 year anniversary next June. Karrels discussed the remodeling of the front entrance area. Karrels spoke of the Space Camp and the activities scheduled. She stated that the  $1^{st}$  Space Camp started three years ago with 8 kids ( $5^{th} - 8^{TH}$  grade) and has progressed to 20 this year. Four of which received Scholarship's to attend (valued at \$375 each.)

**County Farm Education Funds:** A. Karrels requested a grant of \$2,243.82 from the County Farm Education Funds to purchase permanent supplies for the Space Camp (attached). *Motion was made by A. McCoy to approve \$2,243.82 from the County Farm Education Funds for Space Camp Supplies, second by J. Schroeder. Motion carried 5-0.* 

**Local History Room/Wegner Grotto:** J. Roll reviewed May expenditures and presented report to the committee (attached). Roll gave an update on the "Monroe County A-Z" exhibit, stating the exhibit would be delivered tomorrow. Roll issued an invitation to the committee to a special opening reception on Wednesday, June 27<sup>th</sup> from 5-7 p.m. (attached). Roll also updated the committee on the Grotto drainage issue, stating the DOT sloped the ground around the drain in an effort to improve the drainage situation. Discussion followed that if this is not resolved, would seek for a curb to be installed along the road to divert the water flow. *Motion was made by J. Schroeder to accept report as presented, second by D. Pierce, Motion carried 5-0.*

#### **Land Conservation Department:**

- WI Conservation Congress Update: S. Brownell gave a report on his attendance at the WI
  Conservation Congress Meeting. Brownell discussed CWD and mentioned talk of requiring game
  farmers using double fencing to help stop the spread of CWD along with state wide banning of
  baiting and feeding.
- 2. Review May Expenditures: B. Micheel reviewed expenditures. (Report attached).
- 3. **County Conservationist Report:** (attached). B. Micheel gave his report, mentioning the Western Area Tour to be held in the fall and planned for the county supervisors, will focus on their role with the LC Department and the Wisconsin Land & Water Association. Micheel handed out the flyer for the Invasive Working Group Field Day and a reminder that it is this Thursday June 14<sup>th</sup>. Micheel discussed the CWD Task Force met recently to define an action plan for 12 recommendations submitted to the County Deer Advisory Council. Micheel also reported on complaints received: manure stacking and water management issues over the last month.
- 4. Land Use Planner Position Resolution: B. Micheel presented a Resolution for the Land Use Planner position. Lengthy discussion followed with Committee, as Micheel went into detail, discussing the merits for a planner in Monroe County by being proactive. Micheel went on with instances where this would have been beneficial in having a planner on board. Motion was made by J. Schroeder to approve the Land Use Planner Position Resolution, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 6-0.
- 5. **Fishing Easements:** B. Micheel presented three fishing easements for approval. Kenneth & Marlus Schmitz, Leroy & Stephanie Baldwin, and Cathy Braund with Richard & Robert Gruen. *Motion was made by D. Powell to approve fishing easements as presented, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 6-0.*
- 6. Cost Share Agreements-Review/Approve: B. Micheel presented three cost share agreements for approval. Steve Krueger for \$497 for a 425' Waterway, Jim Gehring for \$1,243.50 for 150' Riprap, and Steve Murray for an estimated total cost of \$5,000 for Concrete Stream Crossing. Motion was made by D. Pierce to accept cost share agreements as presented, second by W. Habhegger. Motion carried 6-0.

Chad stated the list price at the time of the offer was for \$464,000, the accepted offer is \$376,000 with three contingencies: 1) County Board approval. 2) Approval for a Knowles Nelson Stewardship Grant for half of the purchase price and approval for an interest free project loan from the WDNR for the remaining balance of the purchase price and closing costs.

- 3. **Resolution to Modify the County Forest Blocking Boundary:** Has been moved to next month.

# **Deke Slayton Space Camp Grant Request**

Project: Space Camp, equipment for additional students and for the future of the camp

Requesting Department: Deke Slayton Memorial Space and Bicycle Museum

Amount Requested: \$2,243.82

### **Project summary:**

Out of the current 50 astronauts on NASA's roster today only 3 of them are from the Midwest. As the home of one of America's first seven astronauts we set out to change this by establishing Space Camp with the goal to inspire students from Monroe County to take an interest in STEM, and space exploration. The students we are inspiring today will be the next generation of astronauts, those that will take us into the next chapter of human exploration and travel to Mars.

We started the Deke Slayton Space Camp in 2016 with 8 students. Today, we have 20 students signed up for this year's 2018 Space Camp. We are thrilled with the success of our camp and very excited to have so many students that want to participate.

With additional students costs for supplies and demands for equipment have risen. For our first two years we were able to borrow equipment from our Board members who are retired teachers, the Monroe County Local History room and the Sparta Free Library, and citizens in the community. However, with our numbers more than doubling in 2018 we simply don't have enough local resources to meet the current demands for the additional students this year. The program has grown and we believe it will continue to be more and more popular with each passing year. A grant will help us purchase the additional supplies to meet the current demand and these supplies will be used at Space Camp for many years to come.

### **Project Connection to Agriculture History:**

The first group of astronauts, of which Deke Slayton was a member, were called the Mercury 7. Many of them came from small towns and grew up on farms, and were often the first ones in their families to attend college. Deke Slayton himself grew up on a farm in Leon, he became a pilot, and went on to be one of the most influential people in the early days of NASA, laying the foundations for the organization today.

Retired astronaut Mark Lee originally of Viroqua was a guest presenter at last year's 2017 space camp and will be returning again this year. During his time as an astronaut he participated in four shuttle missions. On these missions Mark helped map 95% of Venus' surface, was the first to use lasers in environmental research, and was the first to test an untethered self-propelled jet pack in space.

Mark Lee did a wonderful presentation last year for the camp participants and their families. He shared with us that his interest in becoming an astronaut began when he was in middle school; the same age of our Space Camp students. One of the mothers asked Mark what they should be doing to prepare their students to be astronauts.

Mark's response wasn't to study more, or learn complex science. He said "teach your children how to work, and work hard". He went on to tell explain that one of the most valuable lessons he learned was doing farm work as a young teenager. He said it was the hardest work he'd ever done and it gave him a work ethic that prepared him for the rigors of the many years of training, studying, and schooling that he needed to be an astronaut. He actually said "once you do farm work, nothing else seems as hard after that."

### Highlighted Projects and Activities by Jarrod Roll, Hannah Scholze, and Volunteers

   paid bills through the county finance system; processed new donation offerings; conferred with Alli Karrels about museum issues and activities; attended Ag/Extension meeting.



The event focuses 8<sup>th</sup> grade youth from Cashton, Brookwood, and Sparta Hight Point on the work that is done at the county gov't level. 

Surveys handed out at WIC, Families First, Essential Health Clinic, N4N Food Pantry. 208 surveys returned.









# **Monroe County Population by Age**



### **Monroe County Population by Race**




### **Monroe County by Ethnicity**




American Community Survey 5-Yr Estimates 2011-2015








# Why are these things we should pay attention to?

Many of the needs are health-related and several of them contribute to death, including the leading cause of death in the United States; <u>Cardiovascular Disease</u>. High cholesterol, high blood pressure, obesity, and physical inactivity have all been shown to <u>increase the risk of cardiovascular disease</u>. To prevent death in our county and maintain thriving individuals who can contribute to the community, efforts need to be implemented to tackle the risk factors of cardiovascular disease.

In addition to cardiovascular disease increasing the death rate, these needs are also costing taxpayers a lot of money. The <u>CDC reports</u> that one in every six U.S. healthcare dollars is spent on cardiovascular disease each year. In 2015, \$555 billion dollars was spent through direct and indirect costs of cardiovascular disease. Direct costs totaled \$318 billion dollars (spent on medical costs). Indirect costs totaled \$237 billion (spent on lost productivity; days of work lost by employed individuals due to CVD, home productivity loss (days spent in bed due to CVD and the need to hire housekeeping services) and work loss among individuals who are too sick to work). These numbers are rising rapidly and total cost is projected to reach over \$1.1 trillion by 2035. A percent of our paycheck goes directly to Medicare, a percent goes to state taxes, and a percent goes to federal taxes. In Wisconsin, 10% of the General Purpose Revenue Fund (of which 50% is made up from individual income taxes) goes towards medical assistance and BadgerCare. Federal taxes are also used to contribute to health care costs. In summation, a lot of our tax dollars are going towards paying for the national \$555 billion dollars spent on cardiovascular disease!

# What I'm working on:

Addressing cardiovascular disease in a multi-factorial way (physical activity, nutrition, stress reduction, etc), can help us improve the health and well-being of Monroe County residents while also saving all of us money on healthcare spending (both personally, and through our taxes).

### Agriculture Extension Highlights Update May 9, 2018 through June 11, 2018

A Dairy Margin Protection Program Informational meeting was held at Cashton on May 9<sup>th</sup>. There were approximately 40 participants at the workshop. Dr. Mark Stephenson, UW Diary Policy Analyst presented updates on the MPP program.

Petunia plants were identified with an virus we were not able to identify, so plants were sent to the Plant Disease Diagnostic Clinic where they will continue to be grown and samples sent to specialized labs for further testing.

The starter fertilizer use on corn plot has been planted and soil sampled. This trial is in cooperation with Joe Lauer, UW Extension Corn Specialist. It compares the use of starter, at the level the farmer uses with not using starter fertilizer. It is being done in several counties around the state. The trial is side by strips in the field with and without starter fertilizer.

The hops nitrogen trial plot is underway. The initial fertilizer applications, and the petiole sampling to measure nitrogen content of the plants has been completed. Within the next 10 days the final nitrogen applications will be completed. Depending on funding we may take some deep profile soil tests. Harvest of the cones will be done in August. The trial at Tomah is on two hops varieties and there are trials at Rosholt and Waterloo of one variety at each location that match the two at Tomah. This project is part of the UW Extension Hops Working Group program. A Cashton High School Student is serving as co-investigator on this project again this year.

The student who worked on the project last year has submitted it for competition in the State FFA Science Competition.

The Ag Agent attended the annual UW Extension State Hops Summer Field Day on June 8th near Elk Mound.

The corn nitrogen rate trial is also underway. The initial sampling and fertilizer applications have been completed. Within the next 10 days we will take the first canopy color measurements and the side dress applications of nitrogen will be applied. Additional canopy color measurements will be taken up to tasseling. This project is in cooperation with Dr. Carrie Laboski, UW Extension Soils Specialist. A Cashton High School Student is serving as a co-investigator on this project again this year.

A closing wheel trial on corn planters in no-till conditions is being conducted near Tomah. The project is comparing 4 different types of closing wheels with and without pop-up fertilizer and two different down pressure levels. The trial was planted on May 18<sup>th</sup>. This project is in cooperation with Dr. Brian Luck UW Extension Ag Engineer.

The Ag Agent is working on a project to further determine needs and then develop unbiased educational materials to address management practices of the dairy x beef cross calves that are becoming very common. We are looking at this being a joint venture with UW Extension and Michigan State Extension rather than each of us re-invent the same wheel.

The Ag Agent is working on a project with Extension folks led by Dr. Paul Mitchell, Ag Economist, to re-visit grain marketing educational needs and proceed with updating and improving resources available.

The Ag Agent is working with the State Master Gardener coordinator to investigate some options for gardening education at Ft. McCoy.

Farm visits were made to address a variety of topics mostly addressing crops problems, both vegetable crops and agronomic crops. There were also a number of phone calls related to sick plants, fencing laws, and how much is standing hay worth. We made good progress toward getting the additional tractor safety videos completed.

The Ag Agent helped the Monroe County DHIA get their computer network functioning correctly at their new location.

The UW Extension Office had promotional booths at the Dairy Breakfast in the educational tent.

# **CWD Recommendations-DRAFT**

# (As approved for inclusion in the 4/17/18 CDAC meeting minutes)

- 1. Promote deer harvest levels at or below the "maintenance" level in the farmland zone.
- 2. Encourage CWD testing of all deer harvested.
- 3. Provide even distribution across the county for CWD testing drop-off sites.
- 4. Encourage even distribution of venison processing sites across the county to assist donation of venison to food pantries, which could increase harvest.
- 5. Provide a place to dispose of CWD positive deer carcasses and processed venison.
- 6. Provide safe disposal sites for all taxidermists.
- 7. Prohibit cervid farms.
- 8. Prohibit sale and use of urine based cervid attractants.
- 9. Permanently ban baiting and feeding of wild cervids.
- 10. Prohibit sale & use of cervid baiting & feeding equipment.
- 11. Prohibit cervid carcass movement into and out of county.
- 12. Improve information and education efforts including:
  - a. Presentations to sports clubs, schools, and municipal boards & committees.
  - b. Pamphlets
  - c. Web sites
  - d. GIS layers

Outstanding issues to be determined: 1. How to enforce county based CWD control measures? 2. What to do about agriculture products if/when a CWD positive deer is found on agricultural land?
