## Monroe County Natural Resource and Extension Committee

Regular Monthly Meeting – October 9, 2018 Monroe County Ag Service Center – 820 Industrial Dr., Sparta, WI

Committee Members present: N. VanWychen, D. Pierce, J. Schroeder, W. Habhegger, and A. McCoy. Also Present: C. Ziegler (Forestry), J. Roll (History), B. Micheel (LC), B. Halfman (UW-EXT), C. Saxe (UW-EXT Area Dir.), A. Karrels (Deke Sleighton Museum), and P. Peterson (Wildlife Damage Program)

The meeting notice was posted in compliance with the open meeting law.

**Call to Order:** Chair VanWychen called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m.

Public Comment Period: None

**Approve Minutes from the September 11th NR & Extension Meeting:** The committee reviewed the minutes. A motion was made to approve the minutes as presented by A. McCoy, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 5-0.

**Deke Slayton/Bike Museum:** A. Karrels reported the Space Camp was a successful week with 20 kids participating. Karrels gave a brief description of the different activities scheduled. Karrels discussed a second camp for next year for the 3<sup>rd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> grade age group, stating would only be held daily in the afternoons. Karrels was excited to share that the NASA Alumni out of Florida contacted her and stated how impressed they were with the program. They will be donating each year to the Space Camp Program. Karrels also mentioned establishing an endowment by the end of November from the State Historical Society, beginning with \$25,000.

**Local History Room/Wegner Grotto:** J. Roll reviewed expenditures and presented his Director's report to the committee (attached). J. Roll reported the storage agreement between the Local History Room and Sparta church was drawn up by Corporate Council. Roll discussed the need for the upkeep needed on the Grotto. Roll announced that the Wisconsin Federation of Museums awarded the Monroe County Local History Room and Museum the "Museum Award of Excellence" for the A to Z Exhibit. *Motion was made by D. Pierce to accept the History Rooms expenditure and Director's report, second by J. Schroeder. Motion carried 5-0.* 

**County Farm Education Funds:** Chair VanWychen mentioned the news article that was in the local newspapers, for the Wisconsin Cranberry Discovery Center 3-D Wall Mural that was funded by a grant from the County Farm Education Funds.

NRCS Report: C. Holzl presented M. Komiskey's report in her absence. Komiskey reported starting the new Fiscal year without a Farm Bill, some programs are effected, such as Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). Otherwise, Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is moving forward with a special sign-up for storm damage sites, the main focus is to repair conservation practices that were destroyed in the storms. A lower priority is to fix erosion problems that are new due to the storms this summer. Deadline for this special sign-up as well as the regular sign-up in November 16, 2018. Holzl announced that Veronica (NRCS Soil Conservationist) had her baby, Joey on September 18<sup>th</sup>, healthy little guy. Veronica will return to the office November 27<sup>th</sup>.

## Wildlife Damage Program:

- 1. **2019** Wildlife Damage Budget: P. Peterson presented the 2019 Wildlife Damage Budget of \$25,857.81 (attached). *J. Schroeder made a motion to approve the 2018 Budget as presented, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 5-0-1.*
- 2. **Set Crop Prices:** P. Peterson discussed the average crop price for corn and soybeans. *J. Schroder made a motion to approve the average corn price of \$3.28 and soybean price of \$8.90, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 5-0-1.*
- 3. **Set 90% Harvest Date:** *J. Schroeder made a motion to accept Dec* 1<sup>st</sup> *as the harvest date, second by W. Habhegger. Motion carried* 5-0-1.
- 4. **5 year Cooperative Service Agreement:** Motion was made by J. Schroeder to approve the Monroe County Wildlife Cooperative Service Agreement, second by D. Pierce. Motion carried 5-0-1.

## **Land Conservation Department:**

- 1. Review September Expenditures: B. Micheel reviewed expenditures.
- 2. **Re-Purpose of Funds (Capital Outlay):** B. Micheel reported funds of \$10,000 for future vehicle purchase was available from the Justice Department to the Land Conservation Department toward a vehicle. *J. Schroeder made a motion to approve the re purpose of funds-Capital Outlay as presented, second by A. McCoy. Motion carried 5-0-1.*
- 3. **Flood Damage Report:** B. Micheel gave a presentation on the storm damage of the PL566 Structures in Portland Township. Discussion followed.
- 4. County Conservationist Report: B. Micheel reported on the CWD Task Force- handouts for the established CWD sampling stations, carcass disposal sites, ID processors for deer donations, and baiting and feeding awareness flyers for businesses. Is pursuing a ban on deer and elk farming in Monroe County. Micheel stated the August 28<sup>th</sup> Storm Damage set back LCD conservation work for at least a couple of years and the southern part of Monroe County was hit the hardest, with a list of landowners needing assistance approaching 100. Micheel mentioned the upcoming Invasive Species fall workshop planned for October 11<sup>th</sup> at the Scott Town Hall.

## Agriculture Extension Highlights Update September 12, 2018 to October 9, 2018

The Ag Agent presented information on the beef cattle enterprise analysis spreadsheet tools that he authored and co-authored to an Ag Lenders and Farm Management Professionals Workshop held in Kimberly on September 14. There were approximately 80 attendees at the workshop.

The Ag Agent worked with the UW Extension Field Crops Plant Pathology Program to collect samples from 3 fields in Monroe County as part of a statewide screening project for aphanomyces root rot in alfalfa and the various races of the disease in the state.

The Ag Agent and the State Master Gardener Coordinator met with the Ft. McCoy Youth Program Education Coordinator to determine needs. We will be providing a basic vegetable production training for their staff that they will use in curriculum with the kids and their garden boxes at the site.

The Ag Agent work with one of the Amish produce growers in the county to identify problems in peppers and dill. Lab samples identified *Xanthomonas* bacterium, and this was the first time they identified *Xanthomonas* able to infect dill. This disease usually gets into an area through infected seed to start with.

The Ag Agent joined a group of farmers from Texas who were touring Wisconsin looking at potential ideas they could implement to increase revenue on their farms. They visited Superior Fresh, Woods and Meadow, Wetherby Cranberry, and Wisconsin River Meats in this area. There were 83 people in the tour group.

The Ag Agent conducted a Beef Quality Assurance Certification workshop on September 25<sup>th</sup>. We had 61 people attend the workshop. The certification will be required by some of the meat packers beginning January 1, 2019.

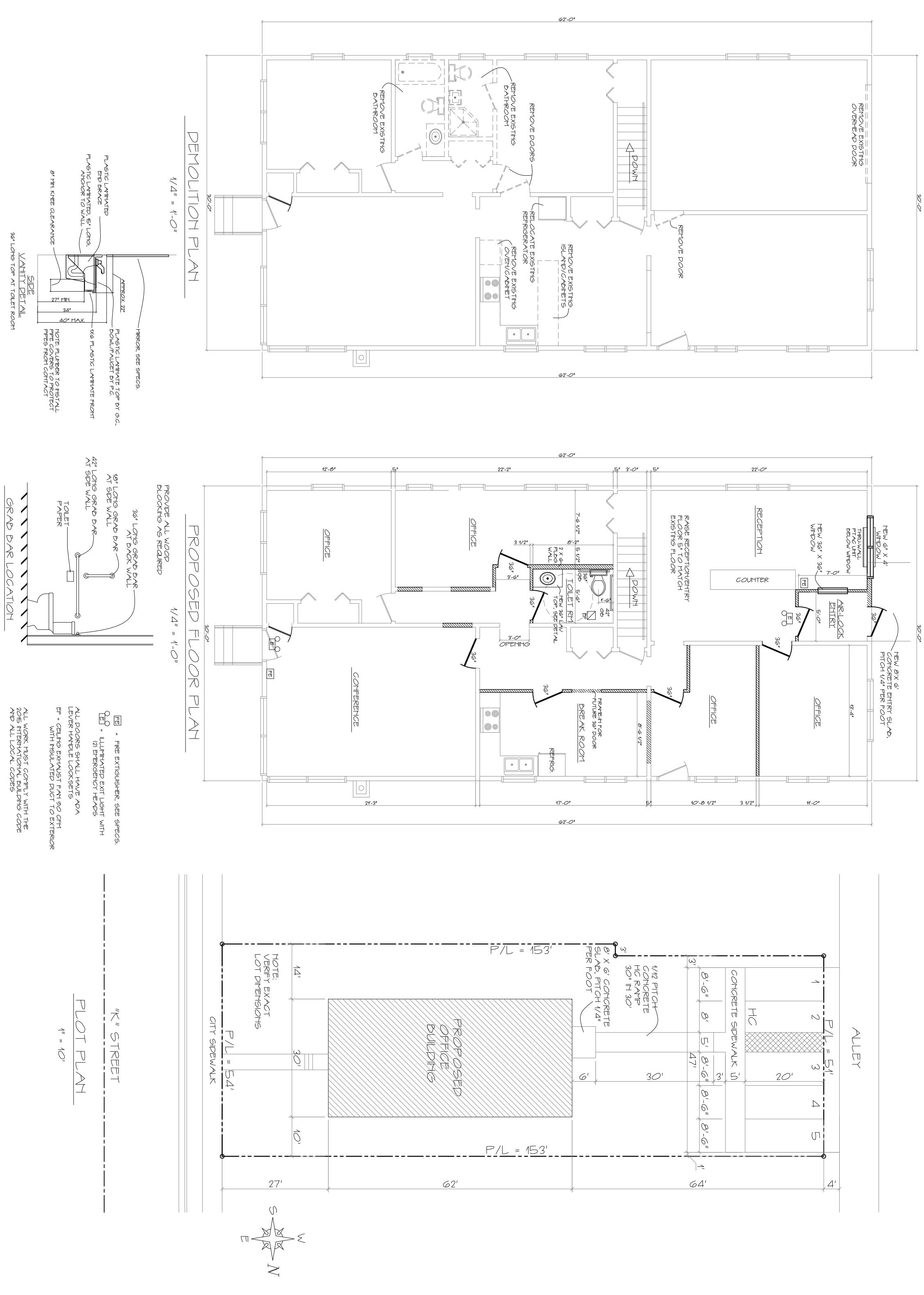
The Ag Agent met with a group of people from Ukraine on October 3rd and 4th addressing feeding out dairy steers and dairy x beef cross animals. October 3rd was spent in a classroom setting and October 4th was farm tours. One of the group was a farmer who owned a large dairy farm, one was in the business of building construction, and third was a young man who is interested in farming. The fourth was the trip organizer who was working with the group.

The Ag Agent has continued to provide information on dealing with flood damaged crops.

The UW Extension Hops Working Group did receive the USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant that was applied for to continue and expand the work with the hops fertilizer management. Cone yields from the Centennial variety comparing both years is in a graph on the back of this report.

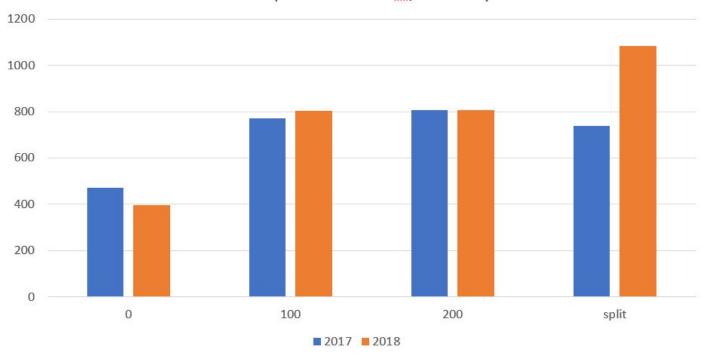

## **LCD Business**:

- <u>Stewardship Awards:</u> Notify winners by the end of week and schedule interviews and farm photos. History plaque and pins being developed for previous Monroe County Award winners. The Cashton HS will work with the LCD to document the award winners in a DVD format for the banquet.
- Monroe County CWD Task Force (Handouts) Established CWD sampling stations, carcass disposal sites, ID processors for deer donation, and baiting and feeding awareness flyers for businesses. Pursuing a ban on cervid (deer & elk) farming in Monroe County.
- Monroe County Invasive Species Working Group A fall workshop (Plant ID, treatment, etc.) is planned for the morning of October 11<sup>th</sup> at the Scott-Town Hall. Target private landowners and municipal road crews. 3 (county funded) Landowners participating in invasive species management in 2018.
- <u>Trout Unlimited Driftless Area Restoration Effort:</u> Tour set for October 16<sup>th</sup> will highlight Monroe County stream restoration (Beaver & Moore Creek) work along with Vernon County. Land Use Planner role would assist with the development of the plan and identify flood mitigation options in the flood plain. Applied for NRCS Emergency Watershed Protection Funds to repair CC24 & 25 this fall.
- <u>2018 Storm Damage</u> August 28<sup>th</sup> and the following week rain event, set back the LCD conservation work for a couple (min.) years. The southern tier of Monroe County was hit the hardest, many of the conservation practices were damaged in the stream corridor along with some of the upland practices. ## Chronic Wasting Disease Factsheet

La Crosse, Monroe, Vernon, Crawford



Counties

## **DNR sampling effort:**

In the fall of 2017, three wild deer tested positive for chronic wasting disease in Vernon county. Though Vernon and Crawford have been on the list of CWD affected counties since the mid-2000's, these new detections now expand the list to include La Crosse and Monroe. The results of an in-depth evaluation of our CWD surveillance history has led to a district wide sampling effort in the DNR's West Central District and is the beginning of CWD detection surveillance across the western/northern portion of Wisconsin over the next 3 seasons. Department staff have established the CWD sampling locations listed on the back to assess the potential geographic distribution of the disease in La Crosse, Monroe, Vernon, and Crawford counties. The list includes existing locations from last year along with additional new kiosks and cooperator location.

## Counties affected:

As required by the law, the 2017 findings enacted two-year baiting and feeding bans in La Crosse and Monroe Counties. The current baiting and feeding ban in Vernon County has been extended to three years and Crawford's current ban will be renewed due to new detections in 2017. La Crosse and Monroe are now considered affected counties because the new CWD-positive results were located within 10 miles of their borders.

## What's the big deal?

Scientific research from Colorado and Wyoming indicates that without control efforts CWD prevalence can reach high levels. In Southern Wisconsin where CWD was discovered in 2002, CWD prevalence within the western monitoring area has shown an overall increasing trend in all sex and age classes. The highest prevalence in that part of Wisconsin is about 35% in adult males. CWD-causing prions can be shed by infected deer and are believed to persist in the environment for a long period of time, exposing other deer to the disease. CWD-infected deer can also spread the disease to other deer by direct physical contact. Once a deer contracts CWD, it is always fatal.

## **Testing** is important

Testing allows the DNR to detect and assess distribution and intensity of CWD in the local herd. Test results will help inform herd management decisions. It is important to test as many adult deer harvested within the surveillance area as possible.

## How can I help?

- Submit heads from harvested adult deer for free CWD testing. See back for sampling sites. For updates go to dnr wi.gov and search "CWD sampling" then click on "registration station database". Hunters should remove head prior to submitting the sample.
- Report all sick deer you observe by immediately calling 608-386-2368 or 1-800-847-9367. During a regular deer hunting season, a hunter who shoots a deer because it appears sick will be issued a replacement tag. Sick deer should be shot in the body and given to your local warden or wildlife staff for CWD testing.

 Properly dispose of deer carcasses. Dispose of deer carcasses through cooperating trash removal services or use meat processors and taxidermists that dispose of deer waste in a landfill. If possible take carcasses directly to an accepting landfill. By putting the carcasses in the landfill, possible CWD-prion contamination of the environment is reduced.

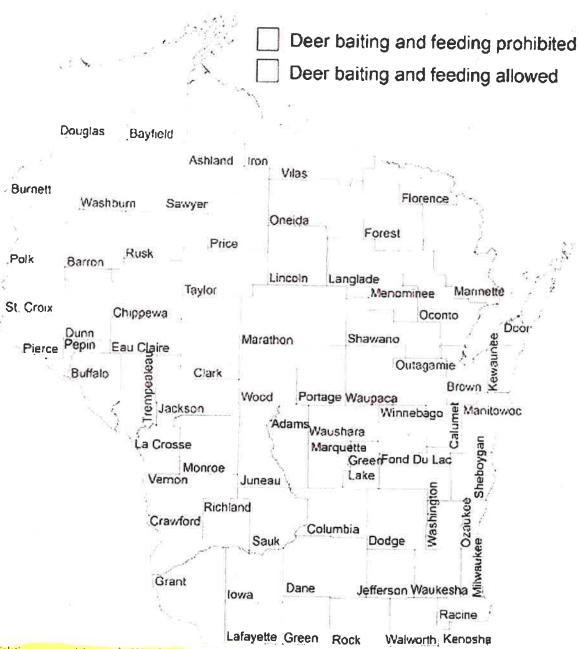
